Proposal:

ECE Culture of Leadership:

The Leadership Initiative is about supporting an ECE culture of leadership and building ECE's leadership capacity, confidence and ability to take our ways of knowing and doing out the door of our practice to the larger community.

Q:

"Please share your Project Leadership Team's motivation for being involved in this leadership program. How have you been involved in developing this proposal? Why do you want to develop your leadership capacity? How will you play a leadership role in implementing this proposal?"

A:

<u>How we got started:</u> Initially the idea of putting a proposal together was brought to the attention of our Shuswap Early Childhood Development Committee by one of the members of our Leadership Team.

Next Steps: ECE members of the ECD Committee were invited to join us as part of the Leadership Team. Although support for the idea was unanimous, only one Early Childhood Educator from the ECD Committee could commit to the institutes required. Discussion amongst ECE Co-workers of Shuswap Children's Association resulted in a commitment from three ECE staff and after distribution of a letter of interest to other Early Childhood Educators outside of the agency, one more ECE signed on. We now had four committed ECE's, the support of our ECD Committee, and a non-profit society willing to take on the administration.

<u>Planning:</u> The four potential leaders met, we decided to submit two names from our agency and one name from outside our agency;

representing group child care. Our fourth leader will take on a large role if we should be successful in our submission.

Our Motivation: After a number of informal discussions and one formal brainstorming meeting before Christmas; a main concern came up again and again. We are motivated to bring a wider awareness to this concern. **Play**, unfortunately is still not a value of our Shuswap Communities. The word Play is thrown around constantly in the jargon of ECE and Early Education but the true value and understanding of what play looks like in Early Childhood is misunderstood. In conversations with Supported Child Development, Early Childhood Educators, Strong Start Facilitators, Parents, School District staff, ECE Students and others; the loss of play and the emergence of academics and competition is widespread.

Why Develop Our Leadership Role ?: We as a group are committed to bringing an awareness campaign around: *Play, Early Childhood* and the *Role of the Early Childhood Educator*, to the wider community of the Shuswap. We hope to create a pool of "*Play Ambassadors*" from our local ECE practitioners and to make "2010-2011" as the year of "*Play*" in the Shuswap.

How We Will Lead?: We feel our core group of leaders (representing: CCRR, ECD Committees, Strong Start Facilitator, Group Child Care Staff, Shuswap Children's Association Executive) will act as mentors and trainers of up and coming ECE leaders in our communities (Shuswap).

Community of Leadership Innovation:

It is up to each Leadership Team to define the community in which you will undertake your project. It can be a large or small geographic community, a community of practice, and Aboriginal community; a cultural community or a self-defined community. The important thing is to reach outside the doors of your program to the broader community so they understand and value the work of ECEs.

Q:

"Please name and briefly describe the community you will involve in this project."

A:

Our Community: We hope to bring our project to the geographic communities that make up the Shuswap region. Within these geographic boundaries we hope to include/involve the Aboriginal cultures within as well as the "communities" of Early Childhood Educators in all licensing categories, parents, school district, business, the arts, recreation, local government, and other citizens.

Community of Leadership Innovation Project:

Each Community of Leadership Innovation will undertake a project to raise the profile and understanding of the value of the work ECEs do in building healthy communities. Your idea doesn't have to be all figured out. The Leadership Initiative will help you develop your plan.

Q:

"Please briefly describe your project. How will it build ECE leadership capacity? How will it help increase public understanding of ECEs work? What community groups will you work with or reach out to? What outcome or change do you hope to achieve?"

A:

<u>The Idea:</u> Briefly we hope to "market" the idea of play, and the idea that we don't need to "speed up childhood" by limiting play in favor of "academics" and competition.

<u>Building ECE Capacity:</u> The logical and ideal messenger/defender of play is the Early Childhood Educator. Our Leadership group has noticed a lack of "confidence" in Early Childhood Educators when it

comes to bringing this message to the parents and the wider community. Through this project we hope to instill a pride and strength of conviction in Early Childhood Educators and give them the tools to share their important work and role outside of the ECE community. Through this project we hope to recruit local ECE's into becoming "Play Ambassadors" and to take their message to the larger Shuswap Community through an organized marketing campaign, participation in naturally occurring community events and presentations to select groups.

Groups to Reach: The groups we hope to present to include: School District Strong Start & Kindergarten, Parents, Playgroups, Parent Advisory, High School Career & Counselors, Preschool Parent Boards, Chamber of Commerce, Arts and Recreation, Municipal Government, Social Service Agencies and other Social Service Professionals.

Groups to Work With: Aboriginal ECE programs and staff (2), Non-Aboriginal ECE programs and staff, Okanagan College ECE Program, Interior Health, ECD practitioners, ECD Committee, Social Service Agencies and staff, School District, Business and local government. (Also many of the groups above)

Outcomes:

- The most important outcome would be instilling confidence in our ECE's, a pride in the work that they do; and creating a pool of ECE's wanting to mentor the next generation of ECE's in our communities.
- Creating a broader-cooperative environment within the ECE community that could be the seeds of a new ECEBC Branch.
- Creating a memorable "slogan" and "visual image" re: Play, that is unique to the Shuswap yet has a universal message that resonates with educators, parents and others.
- Creating an understanding beyond the ECE community in what an Early Childhood Educator does, and what values we represent for children and families.
- Creating a fresh group of ECE "Play Ambassadors" that continue to be resource people recognized and sought out by

- the community as having a certain "expertise" that can be shared.
- Supporting this new group of ECE's to continue mentoring other ECE's.
- Having the values of Early Childhood Educators reach beyond the boundaries of the "already converted" when it comes to play, childhood and the wonder of childhood.

This is a short outline of what we hope to propose.

Kindergartens: Ready for Children?

As September approaches parents of Kindergarten-aged children are asking themselves: "Is my Child Ready?"

"School Readiness and Kindergarten Readiness" are phrases that have attracted a lot of attention lately and can often cause unnecessary anxiety for parents. Often parents are feeling pressure that their children starting school for the first time must meet some measurable academic level such as counting to 10, knowing all their colours or writing their names. This is simply not true. Entering part or full day Kindergarten is simply one of the first steps towards a lifetime of experience and learning.

- "The purpose of full day Kindergarten is to enhance children's overall development – not to rush them into academics at an earlier age." (Full Day Kindergarten Program Guide, BC Ministry of Education)
- "In fact, much of children's early learning take place through play. Play is so important that its significance in children's lives is recognized by the United Nations as a specific right." "Play promotes healthy physical, intellectual, and social-emotional development in ways that cannot be achieved by focusing on narrow pre-academic skills, such as counting to 10 or learning the alphabet." (Full Day Kindergarten Program Guide, BC Ministry of Education)

So how can you prepare your child for their entrance into Kindergarten?

Provide your child with plenty of opportunities for unstructured, uninterrupted play inside and out, alone and with friends. It is through play that children learn communication, negotiation, self-regulation, making choices, creativity, empathy and how to build relationships with others. These are the skills that will prepare them best for the more formal learning that will come in school and life.

What the Research Says

This information can be confirmed by the 08/09 Early Learning Development Instrument (EDI), which is administered by Kindergarten teachers accessing their students for vulnerabilities upon school entrance. District wide (School District 83); the largest proportion of children vulnerable was on the Emotional Maturity scale (12.1%)

 (Child is able to concentrate, help others, is patient, not aggressive or angry, etc)

Interestingly, the smallest proportion of vulnerable children was on the Language and Cognitive Development scale (5.9%)

 (Child is interested in reading and writing, can count and recognize numbers, shapes, etc.)

(EDI Community Summary, School District #83 - Community Summary Fall 2009)

How will Kindergarten Prepare For My Child?

"In British Columbia, children are eligible for Kindergarten in the calendar year they turn 5 years old. The Kindergarten program needs to be supportive of all children, whether they are still four years old or approaching age six when they start Kindergarten. Whatever culture, language, aptitudes, skills, and interests children bring to Kindergarten; it is the school's role to support all children's learning and development." (Full Day Kindergarten Program Guide, BC Ministry of Education)

Why Play? Why Now?

Physical Health:

- Only 12% of Canada's Children & Youth are meeting Canada's guidelines of 90 minutes of physical activity a day. (Active Healthy Kids Canada Report Card 2010).
- Resulting in increase in obesity in very young children and health problems that can follow into adulthood.

Screen Time:

- In 1971, the average age at which children began to watch TV was 4 years; today, it is 5 months.
- Recommendations that screen time should be zero for children under two, limited to 1 hour for kids 2-5. (per day) (Active Healthy Kids Canada Report Card 2010).
- Excessive screen time, TV/Computer/Video Games, interferes with creativity; time spent playing, and being active indoors and outdoors.

Mental Health:

- Children who play; grow into adults who play; and raise children who play.
- Resulting in more happiness and increased mental health all through our lives.
- Source: Common Sense

Overall Development:

Activities for Canada Day Children's Festival 2010

Combined:

SCA, CCRR, and Play Ambassador Project Tent

Water Play Areas:

Using a variety of water tables, wadding pools and tubs we will provide a variety of water play activities for the children.

Washing Tub:

Baby clothes, old fashioned scrub boards, suds and bars of soap, clothes line, clothes pins, laundry baskets.

Children can wash & scrub clothes, transfer to the clothes line, pin up the clothes to dry, and then re-wash them again.

Float & Sink Tub:

Corks, other floaters, small water jugs, funnels, sinkers, small containers etc. Children can engage in general water play.

Boat Making Table & Tub:

Table, boat making supplies like; corks, sticks, duck tape, foam trays, small plastic bottles, permanent markers, wood etc. Any variety of "boat making" materials. Children can create and float their boat creations.

Water Movement Tub:

Clear plastic tubing, PVC and other pipe, funnels, cylinders, containers to pour from. Children can experiment with the movement of water using a variety of items.

Bubbles:

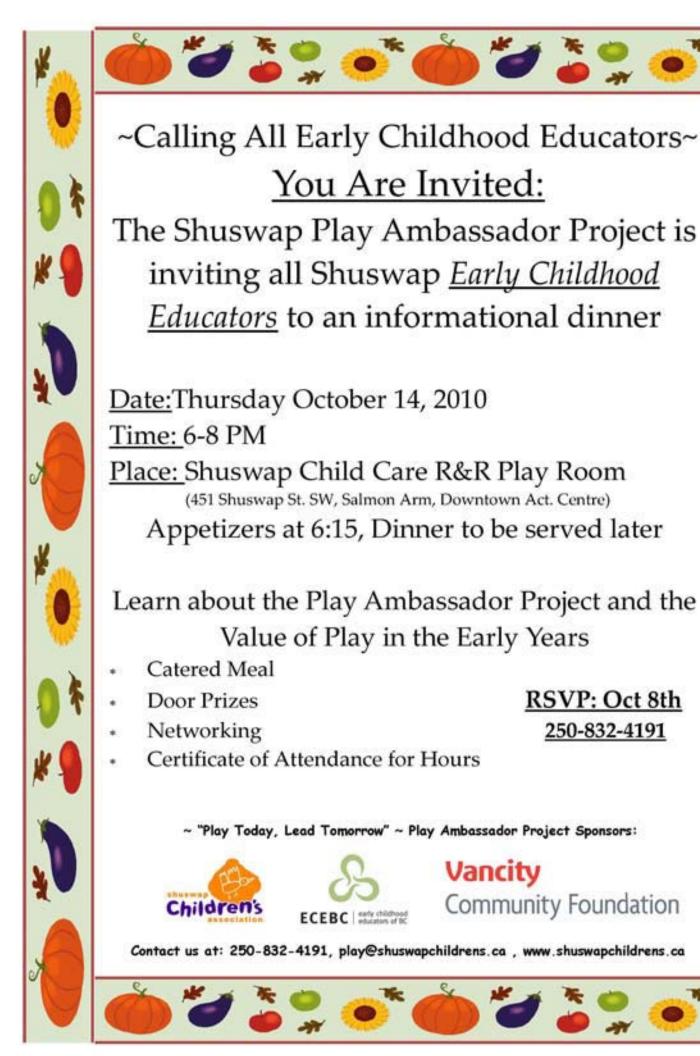

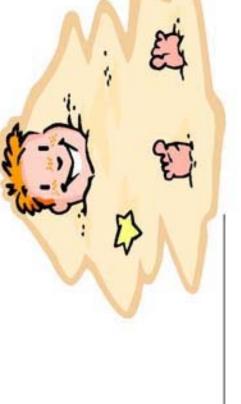

Inside:

"When I was 7 or 8, playing with my best friend at the mal in the shopping carts & forgetting how much time had passed so that we were late and my mom went home so her mom had to bring us both home from the mall. (45 min drive home from town.)"

"Drawing a "bug hotel" with my sister - complete with swimming pools, slides, candy stores, waterslides, etc."

"Thought of a theme and decorated my bedroom door based on the theme."

"Playing school."

"Playing store in my Grammas back playroom. Maybe age 5-6ish."

Outside:

"Playing in Grandma & Grandpa's old barn looking for birds nests, climbing, hiding/playing make believe."

Play memory (Favorite) - "Planting carrots in the garden." "Digging holes in the yard, filling with water."

"Outside in rain and mud."

"Swimming and playing all day in the lake."

"Making mud pies outside on a sunny day."

"Kick the can, hide & seek" "Fort building & neighbours over – outdoor playing in the hay barn."

"Playing soccer on an endless beach in Cornwall England one warm summer afternoon, at the age of 5."

- "Playing with tadpoles in the mud puddle."
- "Playing with friend on a 100 acre Dairy farm."
- "Building tree fort with old boards, etc scrounged from around the farm."
- "Riding horses w/sister on neighbour's cattle ranch."
- "Jumping off the wharf into the lake."
- "Making mud pies outside."
- "Playing cricket with brothers and sister and Dad."
- "Making mud pies & sand cities in the sand box with my sisters."
- " At the beach, 11 years old, swimming at the lake. I was so absorbed that I didn't notice my parents leaving without me."

The Play Experiences of Shuswap ECD Committee Members (Principals, teachers and administrators from the School District, ECEs, Executive Directors, Health Professionals and others)

March 17, 2011

Inside:

- "Playing with my sister, playing babies, making houses play and take over the living room, 2-3 days of play."
- "Used to take Pond's cold cream and pastels, put "stage make-up" on my sisters and myself. We would then put on outdoor plays in the backyard."
- "Jumping on all the couches in my best friend's basement to music & going "round and round" the room."
- "Puzzles, hide & seek, dress-ups, dolls, tea party, games, baking."
- "Played planning a wedding, food, flowers, dresses etc, having the wedding (bride, groom), (groom was a wooden board with face painted on it, clothing). Had bridesmaid, flower girl, pastor."
- "Remember using the cushions from couch & chairs to build a fort in the middle of the living room floor. Played in the fort for hours."
- "My 2 girlfriends and I used to pretend we were wild horses. We choose what colour of horse we would be. I was always the dark brown one."

Outside:

- "Crab families, being at the beach, building houses for the mom, dad and baby crabs."
- "Car track with my cousin Bob during a family reunion, baby peas on the front porch in the sunshine (trying too-it was a really hot summer day)."
- "Hut in the Junk Pile Bluff & rake floor/wooden shelves-broken dishes in shelves-playing house-forgot to come home."

"Dad had huge dirt piles in the yard for some landscaping – I remember playing for hours w/my Hot Wheels creating roads, tunnels & towns in and on the dirt piles."

"Endless hours play & fort building in the scrub brush @ back of $\frac{1}{4}$ acre with all the neighbourhood kids. Weaving sticks, making pretend fires."

"Played baseball w/all of the neighbourhood kids."

"Playing with my sister in our fort that we built in the trees behind our house – didn't even worry about lunch time!"

"Playing in the backyard, make-up games, playing road hockey with all the kids in the neighbourhood."

"Made "mud-cakes" and cookies in the playhouse with my brother outdoors."

"My friend and I built a pool of tarps & boxes & an old slide. It took us awhile to figure out how to keep the boxes from moving from the pressure of the water. We had a great pool that we built. All the neighbour kids came to use it. What an accomplishment!"

"Playing with the neighbourhood kids in the back alley. Made up games of bowling with tin cans and balls, stick ball, and playing "house" "store" and "library" in the neighbours garage."

"Building forts in the bush with sticks, twine, hours & hours having fun."

"Backyard imaginative play with my best friends sister & neighbourhood kids. (Cops and Robbers, Cowboys & Indians, made up plays, playing house etc."

"Playing outside in yard digging in my garden, playing on my trike in yard, playing with dolls, playing at the beach."

"Hide & go seek outside, play in the river."

Playing "leaf houses" and being upset because my brother walked through the walls instead of using the doors. Swimming all day long, except for meals, and having to wait and hour. Taking doll to town to buy her shoes.

"Playing in the "Back 40" with my friends on the downed trees & making up games, imaginary play."

"Building a fort in the woods far in the back of our property. Nails, hammers, and paint all at our disposal."

Play Experiences of ECE Providers April 28, 2011

Outside:

"On a hot summer night in Nova Scotia, doing an old fashioned water gun fight without water guns – water in sunlight dish detergent bottles."

"Climbing the largest poplar tree with a boy (competition), I remember it was a race...I didn't notice how high we were until I hear branches breaking; one, two, three, four then Ohh, the boy fell, tried not to laugh. I won. Always remember this."

"Going in the fields and picking blue bells & dandelions."

"My memories of playing: Me and my sister would climb our maple trees, playing mommy and daughter games and making pretend houses up on the trees. Also pillow and blanket forts held up with hair elastics."

"Family football and soccer games. Balancing on the fence that surrounded our property (spent hours doing that.) Sitting on the roof of the shed."

"Playing in the creek and finding tadpoles & frogs mucking in the water."

"Riding my bike with my friend or siblings to the "Duke trails" (a vacant field). Taking jumps and pretending to be Bo & Luke Duke."

"Had a very large sand pile under a tree, I remember playing on the sand hill, in the roots of the tree with my one single hot wheels car."

"For the first 6 years of my life I lived on Dairy farms. My brothers and I would play in the barn and in the yard and in the trees and in the garden all on our own. I loved to walk through the fields and drop hay on the cow's backs from the hay loft. My most favorite thing to do was pick carrots from the garden, wash them off in a mud puddle and eat them."

"My favorite memory as a child was taking my horse and dog and explore the beaver dams in our trees. My dog would search out the dams and I would watch from my horse and follow the beavers from dam to dam."

"There were a couple of deserted houses where I lived. We would take things out of the houses, scope out a tree with low-hanging branches and a lot of vines & build a fort with our treasures. Our objective was to find a place that the "boys" couldn't find because they always wrecked them. We always went slightly outside the boundaries our parents had set for us."

"Making mud pies cakes and baking them in the sunshine on my mom's laundry steps. She always carefully avoided them."

"Living in the city, getting to go to the beach all day and building sand castles and sand ice cream cones and sand cakes...but fun not pretend eating it and really eating it and ending up with pinworms but worth it! Fun, Fun"

Inside:

"Painting fungus to sell on the side of the road. Oh, rocks too!"

"My Dad making a go-cart and wooden stilts."

"I remember using all of the encyclopedias and covered the living room floor with books stood up like walls for the best Barbie house ever. Hated when I had to clean it up."

Armstrong Parents Play Experiences April 20, 2011

Outside:

"Neighbourhood hide-an-seek" all the neighbours kids, 10+, played hide-nseek through the yards on our block. Awesome!!"

"Playing outside at my cousins we made a river and we set up little "towns" out of pieces of wood and rocks and things we found in the forest. We poured water down the river and spent all day repairing the floods. We didn't need any toys. I was around 8 years old."

"Making forts out in the bush & then having moose wreck them later.

"Fond memory: Age 7-8, snorkeling at Grandmas lakefront cabin. We went to visit every summer. We spent hours on end finding small shells and treasures."

"Forts outside."

"Playing horses – a bunch of us would pretend to be horses, others would be jumps and we would set up a course and jump."

"Outdoor play, front courtyard in townhouse complex, would meet with other kids from the neighbouring houses, play sandbox, ride bikes & big wheel trike as we got older we played capture the flag and kick the can until lights came on at dusk; signaling time to go in."

"Played with siblings & neighbourhood friends. Climbing trees & building forts – spying on the neighbours."
